Memories of Revd. J W A Cowgill

Or do you have any memories of life in our villages in by-gone days? If so, please share them in Heads-Up. Janet Landon starts us off with memories of Revd. Cowgill.

John Wilfrid Alban Cowgill was the rector of our parish from 1953 to 1974. He, his wife, Jean and son, Michael, lived in the Rectory in Headon.

Revd. Cowgill knew everyone in Headon and Upton. Some of you will remember the seaside trips he organized each summer, when two buses were needed to take passengers from each village for a day out in Cleethorpes. Was it always Cleethorpes? I'm not sure. He and his wife also hosted an annual summer garden fete in the Rectory garden, with fancy dress and other competitions and stalls selling various items, to raise funds for the church. Every Christmas there was a children's party at the Rectory, when each child would receive a small gift, and there were children's games nights at the Rectory every Friday evening, after which Revd. Cowgill would take every child home in his car.

I have recently been in touch with some of Revd. Cowgill's relatives. It seems that he was known as Alban to his family, and they shared some stories with me. Alban was one of 13 siblings, 10 boys and 3 girls. All the Cowgill boys were named John – allegedly, so that when they were out playing, their mother could just shout "John" to gain the attention of all the boys!

Alban was always known as a man of great kindness. This was illustrated in a story told at his funeral many years later. When he was a very small boy his church held a toy service, whereby children would bring a toy that would then be given to 'less fortunate children'. It was explained to them that it shouldn't be rubbish but possibly a toy that was in good condition that they didn't need anymore. Alban decided to give his most precious possession, a white teddy that he loved passionately, and he wouldn't heed protests from his family that it was too good to give away. He was vicar of Askham with East Drayton and Stokeham from 1949, and this was later reorganised to include Headon, so then he needed a car! He recalled how he had to cycle on all his visits between parishes, until the Bishop bought him an Austin Seven for £50!

It seems to me that with his departure from Headon, a way of life disappeared, too. With a few temporary exceptions, the church and villages gradually drifted further apart from each other and the level of involvement with parishioners shown in Revd. Cowgill's time is unheard of nowadays, to the detriment of our community.

Watch out for Asian Hornets

The British Beekeeping Association are urging members of the general public to keep a watch out for the invasive Asian hornet, which presents a serious threat to our native honeybees. Asian hornets are now well established on the continent and reports of Asian hornets in the UK are on the rise. Since 2016 there have been 108 sightings in the UK of which 56 were reported in 2023.


Just one Asian hornet can hunt down and eat 30 - 50 honey bees a day and their habit of hawking (hovering) outside the hive stops the bees from collecting nectar and pollen to feed themselves and they will eventually starve.

Asian hornets (*Vespa velutina*) are slightly smaller than native European hornets, have yellow legs, an orange face and brown body with one yellow stripe. It is important to take care not to approach or disturb a nest. Asian hornets are not generally aggressive towards people but an exception to this is when they perceive a threat to their nest.

People who suspect they have seen an Asian hornet should report it immediately using the phone app 'Asian Hornet Watch'
