Wildlife Rescue

Back in March 2021, Heads Up carried a report of a possible otter sighting in the area. No more sightings were ever reporteduntil on one Saturday lunchtime in July of this year a couple were walking along a local footpath that they often walked, when in the middle of the footpath they saw a very young otter cub. The cub was completely out in the open and appeared to have suffered an injury.

They tried to seek advice but being a weekend were unable to raise any local wildlife organisations. They then contacted the UK Wild Otter Trust, which specialises in rescue and rehabilitation. They advised that because of the cub's location, its young age and its condition it should be brought in to be cared for. The only downside to this plan was that the Otter Trust is based in North Devon, so a hastily arranged rendezvous was made for a handover just south of Tewkesbury.



The handover was duly made and the cub was confirmed to be a young female, which the Otter Trust has subsequently named Maya. I'm pleased to say Maya has settled well in her new surrounds and has been paired with a young male cub recently rescued in the Brigg area. Young otters will usually stay with their mother for up to 18 months so it will take around a year in the Trust's care before this pair will be ready for release back into the wild.

The work of the UK Wild Otter Trust can be found on their website www.ukwildottertrust.org where donations in support of their work can be made. Otters are heavily protected under the 1981 Wildlife & Countryside Act, but despite this otters are still a target, so it is on the advice of the Otter Trust that details within this article have been left deliberately vague.

Hopefully we will be able to report on Maya's progress in future editions.

HEADON CHURCH

Headon Church is a medieval gem but it is in danger of being decommissioned for use as a place of worship. The Parochial Church Council has already suggested that the church should be closed and kept locked but at the moment it is still unlocked and certainly upon request it can be used for baptisms, weddings and funerals. However, no services have taken place since February. This situation has come about due to the very small congregation and it seems that services are not viable. When there has been a group service however, other worshippers from East Markham and Drayton in particular, do attend. The future of the church is therefore uncertain and it would be a shame if it fell into disuse on our watch after 800 years of constant use. Let us try and ensure that once again the church can play an active part in our community.

Things you might not know about St Peter Church, Headon

Have you ever wondered how long Headon's church has been there, in the centre of the village? The earliest record I have found about the church says that William Russel, who was the "parson of Headon" had been in big trouble for hunting hares in the king's manor but was pardoned by the king in 1234. He was rector from 1226 – 1248.

So, the church was already there in 1226, but we don't know when the building work started, except that it must have been way before 1226, and went on for many years. Work must have been interrupted when the Black Death struck in 1348 – 50. In 1349, the worst year of the plague, Headon's vicar, John de Crofton died. At around the same time a massive chest was made from the hollowed out trunk of an oak tree and brought into our church. It's still there!

A tomb slab, showing a knight wearing chain mail armour, was discovered in the 1980s. It is probably from the tomb of Simon de Headon, the lord and owner of Headon. Simon was High Sheriff of Nottinghamshire in 1259. Was he Robin Hood's adversary?

The church once had two bells, but only one remains. It bears the inscription "Cum voco venete" meaning "Come when I call". The two-bell frame is made from wood felled between 1408 and 1428.

The churchyard was fenced by volunteers in 1885. That fence lasted for over 130 years, until, once again, volunteers from the village were called upon to replace it.

Come when I call!

Our church has been here for more than 800 years! It has been used by thousands of people. It has been used for worship and as a peaceful place for contemplation, but also as a community space, where people could meet to celebrate, protest or discuss events. In all these years, it has never been unused – until now.

You are the successors of all those people! Will you support the church in its time of need? There is a very real risk that it will be closed by the diocese, if we can't turn things around.

The church needs to be used and it needs your support. Of course it needs financial support, but, more than that, it needs people.

We aren't asking much! If everybody did a little, that would make such a difference! Could you be a key holder, keeping an eye on the building for signs of problems? Letting visitors into the church and chatting with them? Could you dust and vacuum from time to time as necessary?

Not long ago, there were flower festivals, various exhibitions and art displays and evenings of music. Surely some of these beautiful events could happen again. Could you, maybe with a friend or partner, organise such an event? It really wouldn't be difficult!

Would you be prepared to attend church services either occasionally or regularly? Or make a regular or one-off donation to the church?
