Notes from the Meeting held on Monday 4th July 2011

Parish Council Vacancies

As there are still two vacancies at Grove, we ask you to please contact the clerk or Cllr. Jonathan Wallwin if you are interested in becoming a parish council member. Your main commitment is to attend 10 evening meetings per year and to be a contact for residents between meetings. The level of involvement outside of this commitment is purely dependent on your own interests.

Bus Shelter

A new wooden bus shelter is to be installed at Yew Tree Road in Headon. A proposed design has now been received which reflects others in the local area. It is proposed to be installed between the existing telephone box and litter bin but set back from the pavement so as not to create a safety hazard to motorists and pedestrians.

Questionnaires!

It appears to be the time of year for reviewing services, judging by the number of questionnaires and surveys the parish council received this month. We had surveys to complete on a variety of subjects, including... Planning issues, Police matters, Polling arrangements and Broadband services.

Street Lighting in Nottinghamshire

We have had some draft proposals regarding changes to street lighting in Headon-cum-Upton, as part of the County Council's 4 year programme of energy saving measures.

The draft proposals may include:

Switching off completely some lights where they are no longer considered necessary

Dimming some lights on main roads between 10pm and 7am when traffic flows are low and a lower level of lighting will not affect road safety.

Switching off some lights between midnight and 5.30am in residential areas in consultation with local communities

The project is expected to save 26% of current energy usage..
