## **Notes from meeting on 4 September**

### **1 Members of the public**

On behalf of the Council, the Vice-Chair welcomed three residents of Grove to the meeting. The Council hopes that members of the public will continue to take advantage of the opportunity to join in the Open Session which now precedes each meeting.

### **2 Village Appraisal**

The Headon-cum-Upton and Stokeham Appraisal Questionnaires have been delivered. To date some 51 of 74 delivered in Headon-cum-Upton and 13 out of 18 delivered in Stokeham have been returned. Those who have not completed their questionnaire because of holidays etc still have time to do so. The questionnaires are now being analysed by the Rural Community Council and the results should be available within about a month. The Grove Appraisal is at the final draft stage. The questionnaires for the businesses on the industrial estates at Headon and Stokeham and for the Headon-cum-Upton Youth Forum will be ready shortly.

### **3 Speed limits/road safety**

Nottinghamshire County Council has finally agreed to extend the 30 mph limit in Stokeham, but says it does not have the money to do so until next financial year. The Council is to make representations to try to get this decision implemented much sooner. The Council is also to arrange to meet the County Council to discuss dangerous road junctions in Headon. Street Nameplates The street nameplates for Headon-cum-Upton and Stokeham have been ordered and will be delivered in due course.

### **4 Planning application – Carmalor Homes, Grove**

The Council objected to this application. It felt that no development should be permitted until the mains drainage scheme had been completed and a suitable method of dealing with surface water implemented. However, even if these two measures were in place, the pond would still overflow at times of heavy rain. Furthermore, the Council was concerned about the safety of children near water and that the access to the site is on a blind bend. The Council also considered its response should the scheme receive planning permission. Firstly, it would be extremely reluctant to assume responsibility for the pond; secondly, if the scheme were to go ahead, the Council would ask that the whole site be surrounded by traditional hedges.

### **5 Street Lights**

The County Council has found the money to install additional street lights outside the Church Hall in Grove and near to the bus shelter in Upton. Hopefully this work will be completed in this financial year.

### **6 Power Cuts**

Last November representatives of PowerGen came to a meeting of the Council to explain the action they were intending to take to reduce the incidence of power cuts. In view of the number of recent power cuts, it appears as if nothing has been done and the Council intends to press PowerGen to get on with the work.

### **7 Grants to Churches**

The Council approved grants towards the cost of maintaining the churchyards at Headon and Stokeham. (Note: a request for a grant has now been received from Grove PCC and will be considered at the next meeting).

### **8 The Old Smithy**

With Ferndene now up for sale, the Council is to make enquiries of the County and District Councils to see if it would be possible to have a preservation order made on this building.

### **9 Audit of Accounts for 1998/99 and 1999/2000**

The Clerk reported that the audit was scheduled to be completed by 6 September. (Note subsequent to the meeting: the audit was satisfactorily completed on that date).

### **10 Next Meeting**

The next meeting of the Council will be held in Grove Church Hall at 7.30 pm on Monday 23 October. Members of the public are cordially invited to attend.

Hello

Welcome back to bird wise. I have just returned from a rather hectic week's bird ringing course held at West Burton Power Station. The course an annual event is organised and run by bird ringers who live in North Nottinghamshire. It is one of several formal ringing courses organised and run on behalf of the British Trust for Ornithology. These events have a number of functions from allowing individuals who are training to be bird ringers to get experience in handling species which they may not catch in their own area. To some individuals who are in the process of seeking what we call a ringing permit upgrade. This means that they undergo a review of their capabilities whilst on the course all of which is observed by an independent panel of qualified trainers. If successful they are then allowed to upgrade their permit. Some twelve individuals attended the course this year, some from as far afield as Scotland. We also had some fifteen trainers and assistants on the course. (I will explain the permit structure in more detail in some future report).

Catching birds for the purpose of ringing them is very tightly controlled and a government licence is required to handle any bird for the purpose of ringing them. These are managed by the British Trust for Ornithology on behalf of English Nature. A period of extensive training is required before anyone is allowed to eventually go out with the intention of catching birds. As I have already said the course which normally runs in early August gives a general indicator as to how successful many bird species have performed in their breeding attempts during the current year. This year nearly one thousand birds were ringed at the site during what was a rather, unsettled week weather wise.

Unusual birds caught included a Green Woodpecker, four Great Spotted Woodpeckers, a Tawny Owl and a Wood Warbler. Almost forty different species were caught during the week. However, despite the variety of species and the numbers of birds handled breeding success for many species, appears to have been very poor. There were clearly on or two exceptions but many of the summer migrants appear to have given up early and some are clearly already starting out on their migration. Resident species such as Blue Tits, Great Tits, Robins and Wrens also appear to have had limited success. Although contrastingly Song Thrush and Blackbirds seem to have done exceptionally well with the prolonged damp conditions obviously providing plenty of worms for them.

Even as I write this Swallows are already starting to congregate on the overhead wires. Are they early this year? Or is it my imagination. Nevertheless now is the time to keep your eyes open. Migration time means that literally anything can turn up anywhere at any time. So do not be surprised if you see something unusual in your garden or flying overhead. After all I have had Osprey, Marsh Harrier, Buzzard and Peregrine Falcon all flying over Headon at some time or other in recent years.

**NOTTINGHAMSHIRE ROYAL SOCIETY FOR THE BLIND**
